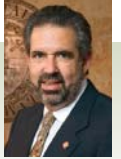

... Former Federal Election Commission chairman Brad Smith doubts it's a substantial amount. Besides, he says, most of the tricks are legal. Or at least not illegal. And the chances of getting caught are low.

SMITH: All of the presidential campaigns that take government funding are audited. But of course in this campaign, most of the major candidates have said they're not going to take government funding, so they will not automatically be audited. And the number of campaigns the FEC audits is relatively small. It's sort of like the IRS with tax returns. Most people know, can feel fairly comfortable they won't be audited.
